

212 women die per 100,000 live births due to pregnancy-related causes in Equatorial Guinea


The maternal mortality ratio in Equatorial Guinea has improved from 427 in 2000 to 212 in 2020. Maternal mortality in Equatorial Guinea is lower than its regional average. Maternal mortality ratio is the number of women who die from pregnancy-related causes while pregnant or within 42 days of pregnancy termination per 100,000 live births.


In Equatorial Guinea, the rate of adolescent fertility has decreased since 2010. The rate in 2021 was higher than the average rate in its income group.



The female rate in Equatorial Guinea is lower than both Sub-Saharan Africa and the upper-middle income group. Lower secondary education completion rate measures how many children have completed the last grade of lower secondary education regardless of age completed.




Adult literacy in Equatorial Guinea is lower among women than among men (2010)

In Equatorial Guinea, both women and men have very high literacy rates. Adult literacy rate is the percentage of people ages 15 and above who can both read and write with understanding a short simple statement about their everyday life.



In Equatorial Guinea, the labor force participation rate among females is 51.6% and among males is 59.5% for 2023

The labor force participation rate is the proportion of the population ages 15 and older that is economically active. Since 1990, female labor force participation has remained roughly the same. Compared with labor force participation in the upper-middle income group, the gap between men and women is lower in Equatorial Guinea.



Vulnerable employment for females has improved in Equatorial Guinea since 1991

Workers in vulnerable employment are the least likely to have formal work arrangements, social protection, and safety nets to guard against economic shocks; thus they are more likely to fall into poverty. Vulnerable employment among women is 86.1% and among men is 72.2% in Equatorial Guinea for 2022. The rate of vulnerable employment is similar for men but higher for women in Equatorial Guinea compared to the average rate in Sub-Saharan Africa.

In Equatorial Guinea, the share of women who have experienced intimate partner violence is greater than the world average, 27%

Intimate partner violence is by far the most prevalent form of violence against women globally and is defined as the percentage of ever-married women (ages 15-49) who have ever experienced physical or sexual violence committed by their husband or partner, whereas those who have ever experienced any form of sexual violence is the percentage of women (ages 15-49) who ever experienced sexual violence irrespective of marital status and perpetrator.



Women in parliaments are the percentage of parliamentary seats in a single or lower chamber held by women. The proportion of seats held by women in Equatorial Guinea has increased since 2010. The current rate is higher than the average rate in upper-middle income countries.
