

5 women die per 100,000 live births due to pregnancy-related causes in Turkmenistan


The maternal mortality ratio in Turkmenistan has improved from 26 in 2000 to 5 in 2020. Maternal mortality in Turkmenistan is nearly the same as its regional average. Maternal mortality ratio is the number of women who die from pregnancy-related causes while pregnant or within 42 days of pregnancy termination per 100,000 live births.

In Turkmenistan, the rate of adolescent fertility has remained roughly the same since 2010. The rate in 2021 was lower than the average rate in its income group.



In Turkmenistan, the labor force participation rate among females is 49.4% and among males is 46.7% for 2023

The labor force participation rate is the proportion of the population ages 15 and older that is economically active. Since 1990, female labor force participation has decreased. Compared with labor force participation in the upper-middle income group, the gap between men and women is lower in Turkmenistan.

Vulnerable employment for females has improved in Turkmenistan since 1991

Workers in vulnerable employment are the least likely to have formal work arrangements, social protection, and safety nets to guard against economic shocks; thus they are more likely to fall into poverty. Vulnerable employment among women is 29.9% and among men is 27.9% in Turkmenistan for 2022. The rate of vulnerable employment is higher for men and women in Turkmenistan compared to the average rate in Europe & Central Asia.



In 2017, 35.5% of women and 45.7% of men in Turkmenistan had an account

The gap in account ownership between men and women in Turkmenistan, 10.2, is larger than the gap of the Europe & Central Asia aggregate, 4.3. Account ownership denotes the percentage of respondents who report having an account (by themselves or together with someone else) at a bank or another type of financial institution or report personally using a mobile money service in the past 12 months.



25.9% of seats in national parliament were held by women in 2022 in Turkmenistan

Women in parliaments are the percentage of parliamentary seats in a single or lower chamber held by women. The proportion of seats held by women in Turkmenistan has increased since 2010. The current rate is similar to the average rate in upper-middle income countries.

Seats held by women in national parliaments, female (%)




